The Big Question

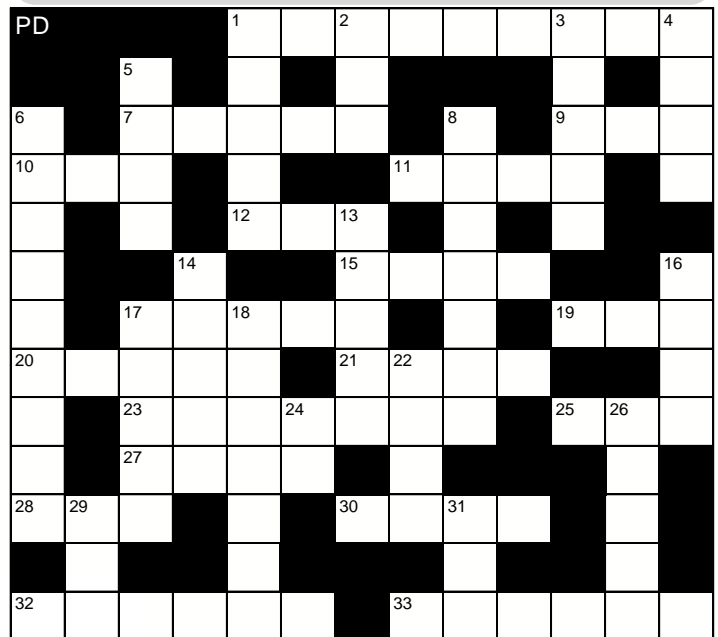
The most important issue about the NIIS that arose from this morning's plenaries was not access, funding or portability, but how do you pronounce the acronym?
